### A YEAR OF CHANGING THOUGHT AND ACTION

We are ending one of the significant years in Australian political and cultural growth, when latent distaste for war and gaoling of resisting youth hardened into action to remove from Government the authors of the Australian chapter in the tragic tale of Vietnam.

Suddenly a pattern emerged in public thinking, linking this waste of national resources and youth to the sell-out to foreign capital, the failure to provide essentials such as efficient transport systems, to act against growing unemployment or curb inflationary pres -sures. And against this background a growing strike movement forcing wage increases from reluctant employers. The Liberals were doomed by this thinking and the actions of workers and with their defeat went the outmoded thinking which was incapable of solving this generation's problems.

In our short experience of the temporary two-man Labor Government We seem to be stepping out into the world, taking our place in support of policies aimed at promoting peace and maintaining human dignity

The Liberal Government has gone and the Liberal Party is to be reconstructed closer to the needs and thinking of the people, accordto leading members. Action by the people has changed the Australian political scene and it will never again be exactly the same; it is even possible the Australia Party could become Labor's chief opponent in the not far distant future, even if this means absorbing the Liberal Party.

Meanwhile the best base for further progressive activity should be found in the trades union movement.

Merry Christmas gardeners and a highly productive New Yearto Metal Trades Grades is to follow.

Holiday times bring problems but if you have a good neighbour you can forget watering as should receive:one of these. Otherwise mulching to minimise evaporation of moisture is a holiday preparation must.

Old manure, leaves, half-rotted ustrial stoppage or lecompost, even water-soaked paper, placed on soil surface will help conserve moisture but dont let it pack down tight as the soil must have air. Pot plants may be buried to the rim in gar -den beds in cool yet light and airy positions, under a tree will do; water soil and pot well then mulch.

An interesting way for providing water to plants in pots is illustrated outside our Medical Centre, alarge bottle of water suspended over the pots and water seeping down.

Pick all reasonably sized vegetables and fruit and matured flowers. Left on they will quickly send off the plants.

> \$30 back pay plus 6 increase this pay.

Any time lost thru indave without pay is to be deducted from this \$36.

In the case of Workshop Laborers they receive a minimum wage of \$58.15 in 1st year with additional amounts up to 4th year, and these amounts are in excess of their award wage. The amount of this excess being deducted from the present increase. This means W. S. Laborers will receive:

1st year, \$1.15 a week 2nd year, \$1.65 a week 3rd year, \$2.15 a week 4th year, \$3.00 aweek.

There will be no tax deducted from back money as is is not possible to do this for machine produced (computerised) pay dockets. Keep this in mind for next tax year.

# RAILWAY UNIONS METAL TRADES

Total income from the \$1 levy for conduct of the recent cam -paign on the \$3 flow-on was an amount of \$4002. Disburse -ments from this amounted to \$2663.31 for payment of wages to men involved in stoppages, plus 312 payment for cheque book. From the balance an amount of \$1226.50 has been placed in a trust fund with the Railways Credit Union and an amount of \$.19 left in account with Commonwealth Bank. full balance will be used for future Railway Metal Trades Campaigns.

Every man who contributed his \$1 levy is now benefitting to the extent of \$3 a week, with very few exceptions. This means \$156 a year for one levy of \$1. a truly profitable investment. The few who haven't paid their levy should now do so.

- 1. Consultation with unions and members concerned before making changes.

- 3 Hostel to be retained and improved without additional cost to employees.
